ORGAN AND CHORAL MUSIC ONLINE. Many of us have been exploring what is available on the web. There is a huge amount of material available, whether on Facebook, YouTube or beyond. Our top 10 (well, 11 actually) suggestions are:

- On Maundy Thursday, April 9th, at 11am Alexander Binns, Derby Cathedral's DoM, will lead favourite Passiontide hymns on the Derby Cathedral Facebook page <https://www.facebook.com/derbycathedral>
- On Good Friday, April 10th, at 5pm the Music Department at St Edmundsbury will present a virtual Come and Sing Stainer's *Crucifixion* run by the Cathedral's Acting DoM, Richard Cook and accompanied by William Saunders. - Also on Good Friday, BBC Radio 3 broadcasts the St John Passion (2pm) and the St Matthew Passion (7pm)

- On Easter Day, April 12th at 5pm, Richard McVeigh will present a virtual organ recital on the Hauptwerk set of the organ of Sint-Laurenskerk, Rotterdam. The programme includes Bach's Prelude and Fugue in E flat BWV 552, Frank Bridge's Adagio in E, and Vierne's Organ Symphony No. 3. Richard's Beauty in Sound channel has much more superb uplifting viewing too, including a previous Sint-Laurenskerk recital, Lenten hymns and a spectacular two-and-a-half hour HymnFest. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=m1Y-LeizR5I>

**ORGAN RESOURCES.** Both the Royal School of Church Music and the Royal College of Organists have been very active in making available online resources, and the enterprising music department at St Edmundsbury has launched three virtual music competitions:

- RSCM <https://www.rscm.org.uk/>. RSCM's website now features a Hymn for the Day and a Sunday Self-Service - a simple act of worship with music, readings and prayers which will change weekly. It also has specific resources for Holy Week and Easter and is featuring daily webinars. In the mornings, it is covering a range of topics for choir trainers, organists and music leaders and on vocal coaching, organ studies, aural skills and choral conducting. All these resources are open and free for all, not just RSCM members.
- RCO <https://i.rco.org.uk/>. RCO is making its virtual campus available to everyone free of charge until 30 June. Resources include more than 300 videos, audio files, papers, articles and other content covering everything from technique to repertoire, performance to professional skills. It is also offering a weekly blog of new suggestions of things to do. Anyone wishing to access iRCO for the first time should visit [i.rco.org.uk](https://i.rco.org.uk/) and register for a guest or member account as appropriate.
- St Edmundsbury Cathedral Music department <https://stedscathedral.org/music/> is not only offering a piece of organ music daily on its Facebook page but has launched three online competitions for young musicians - one for organists, one for pianists and one for composers. Entries are to be uploaded to the cathedral's music team and will be judged by professional panels led by the Cathedral's music staff.
